


• Romantic music is a term referring to a particular historical period in European music, art and literature, from about 1820 to 1900.



• It is important to know that "romantic music" and the phrase "Romantic music" have two different meanings

- The first, "romantic music," is commonly used to indicate any kind of music that is expressive of personal feelings
- The second, "Romantic music" refers to the period in art, music and literature between 1820 and 1900

- The Civil War takes place


- People were moving west and finding gold in California during the 1849 gold rush

Samuel Morse patented the telegraph in 1840

He was a painter turned inventor and invented a method of using electrical impulses for communication




- The first telegraph lines were put up between Baltimore and Washington DC in 1844
- By 1861 there were lines from coast to coast

The California Gold Rush



- The California Gold Rush began in 1848 and ended in 1855
- It began when gold was discovered at Sutter's
   Mill
- News of the discovery soon spread, resulting in some 300,000 men, women, and children coming to California in search of gold

• The U.S. Civil War



- There were many reasons for the Civil War
- The southern states felt that the northern states wanted to violate the constitution
- Eleven slave states seceded from the Union and formed the Confederate States of America led by Jefferson Davis

- The first shots were fired in 1861 at Fort Sumpter in South Carolina when the confederates attacked
- President Lincoln called for volunteers for armies in each state
- In response, 4 more state seceded from the union




Civil War Soldiers

- It was a long and arduous war that killed a total of 620,000 people
- The war finally came to an end when General Lee surrendered to General Grant in Virginia in 1865



The first working telephone

- A practical telephone was actually invented independently by two inventors working in the United States, Elisha Gray, and Scottish-born Alexander Graham Bell.
- Incredibly, both men filed for a patent on their designs at the New York patent office on February 14, 1876, with Bell beating Gray by only two hours!

• Although Gray had built the first electromagnet receiver in 1874, he was not able to master the design of a workable transmitter until after Bell had



• In the world of visual art, landscapes became a more popular subject to paint

- Impressionism became popular in art and music
- The objective was to create and impression of something rather than painting an exact image






Impression of a sunset by Claude Monnet

A self portrait of Vincent van Gough in the impressionistic style






Self portrait of Paul Cezanne

- One of the most famous painters in this style is George Saurat




Sunday in the Park by George Saurat



- Music, like art, in the Romantic Period created the impression of something
- Program Music (music that paints a picture or tells a story) becomes popular during this period

- A few of the famous composers of the Romantic Period are:
  - Nikoli Rimsky-Korsakov
  - Camille Saint-Saens
  - Peter Tchaikovsky
  - Fredric Chopin



- One example of Program music is "Flight of the Bumble Bee" by Nikoli Rimski-Korsakov
- Another is "Danse Macabre" (Dance of Death)
   by Camille Saens

- The Romantic Period is also a time of Nationalistic music
- This music used folk melodies and patriotic melodies as part of their music
- The "1812 Overture" by Tchaikovsky is an example of nationalistic music

 Much of the piano music written at this time was not what the average pianist could play at home

• Examples of these complex and difficult pieces are the collection of Nocturnes by Fredric

Chopin

• The Romanic Period came to a close with the the beginning of the new century - the 20th century!
